# HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Americans generate 1.6 million tons of hazardous household products per year. To prevent pollution from hazardous household products, protect the health of your family, and preserve the environment, proper disposal is needed.

To dispose of these hazardous products, please be sure to utilize Palo Alto's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Station.

#### Location:

2501 Embarcadero Way, Palo Alto, CA 94303

### Hours:

Every Saturday: 9am – 11am First Friday of the month: 3pm – 5pm

#### **Guidelines:**

- Must be a Palo Alto resident (driver's license or vehicle registration)
- Up to 15 gallons or 125 pounds of HHW per visit (no larger than 5-gallon containers)

## Some accepted items include:

- Latex and oil-based paint, household batteries, auto batteries, small electronics with embedded batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, antifreeze, gasoline, motor oil, cooking oil, medication, household injection needles, pesticides, cleaners, propane tanks, and more.



#### **HHW Reuse Zone:**

The HHW Reuse Zone is a reuse program for gently used, good quality household products such as paint, cleaners, and unused motor oil that are brought to the HHW Station for disposal.

- Open during HHW Station hours
- Visitors are allowed to take up to five household products per visit
- Residency in Palo Alto is not required to use the HHW Reuse Zone

# **SORTING GUIDANCE: CLEAN FILM PLASTICS**

Clean film plastics such as empty bread bags, zip lock bags, bubble wrap, or shrink wrap can be recycled, but these items are required to be bundled together first.

This does not include items such as chip bags, snack wrappers or packaging, or cellophane, which need to be disposed of into the black landfill cart. Single, loose, or soiled film plastic pieces also need to be disposed of into the black landfill cart. Only bundled clean film plastics can be placed into the blue recycle cart.

When gathering film plastics in your home, please be sure they are clean and dry. Bundle all film plastics together into one clear plastic bag, tie it up tight, and place it in your blue recycle cart. The film plastic bundles should be about the size of a soccer ball or larger.

Bundling film plastics together helps keep the material clean and easily identifiable to sort. Loose film plastics can get tangled in the recycling sorting equipment and slow down the process. Additionally, loose film plastics get dirty in the process making them undesirable and unlikely to be recycled. When properly placed into recycling containers, film plastics can be recycled into several resources including composite lumber used for decking, fencing, and other outdoor uses.
