



Recycling right starts with making the right choices when purchasing items for your business because much of what we throw out is packaging. Choose items packaged in environmentally friendly packaging, and for items you sell, choose packaging that can be reused or recycled locally.

If we use the recycling hierarchy of "Refuse, Repair, Reduce, Reuse, and (then) Recycle" to make purchasing and packaging decisions for our businesses, we will have a more sustainable local economy. If you have a supplier you like who ships products in packaging that you can't recycle locally, let them know about the problem. Suggest they investigate other packing materials that are better for the environment.

When buying items with packaging or selling items in packaging, choose materials that are easiest to recycle locally. Even though GreenWaste customers can recycle plastics numbered #1 through #7 and "bagged" clean film plastic, the easiest materials to recycle locally are #1 and #2 plastics, glass, uncoated cardboard, paperboard, iron, tin, aluminum, and other non-ferrous metals. All local programs also accept the wood from unpainted wood pallets in their green organics bins. Packaging to avoid: Styrofoam, individually wrapped single-use items, packaging that's hard to recycle and can't be reused, and mixed materials not accepted by your local recycler.

KEEP BATTERIES OUT OF THE LANDFILL

It is important to dispose of ALL batteries properly! Batteries do NOT go in the trash or recycling.

Mismanaged batteries can leak toxic materials into the soil and groundwater, which can then reach our water supply. Batteries present a fire risk when over-charged, short-circuited, submerged in water, and when they are damaged. Please tape 9 volt terminals.

For proper disposal, bring batteries to a Santa Cruz County Household Hazardous Waste facility, accepting all household batteries (alkaline, button batteries, nickel-cadmium):

- Buena Vista Landfill: Open Fri. and Sat. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM, Wed. 7:30 AM-2:30 PM.
- Ben Lomond Transfer Station: Thurs. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM
- City of Santa Cruz Resource Recovery Facility: Sat. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM



COMMERCIAL FOOD WASTE COLLECTION

Keep up the good work by placing all food and yard waste in your green cart. Diverting food and yard waste from the landfill saves the planet by reducing the production of methane gas. Business owners are responsible for training staff members in proper waste management practices.

- Place baking soda at the bottom of the organic container once it is emptied to help absorb grease; spray bug spray or citronella to keep bugs away
- Provide plant trimmings or mulch next to the organic container to have employees cover food waste to minimize odors

CUSTOMER ACCESS

To Trash, Recycling & Organics Disposal Containers

State law requires businesses to provide customers with easy access to clearly marked waste sorting containers for recycling (blue), trash (grey), and organics (green). State mandated enforcement begins January 1, 2024. Are you ready?

BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AND PUT YOUR CARTS AWAY

Santa Cruz County Code section 7.20.150 only allows GreenWaste Recovery collection containers to be placed within the right-of-way for 24 hours before and after pick-up time. Containers must be put away at all other times.





REDUCE WASTE: GO PLASTIC-FREE AND REUSABLE!

Why switch from single-use disposable to reusable for food service ware? Whether in your break room or dining room, eating from plastic and plastic-lined paper plates and cups can be harmful to our health, and our environment.

Plastic leaches toxins into our food and our bodies. Many single-use alternatives contain PFAS, which has been shown to damage hormone and thyroid function and sperm production. Serving food and drinks on paper or plastic plates and cups may cause a customer not to return, as many know about PFAS and how this forever chemical hides in many single-use items.

Most of the PFAS-free compostable products do not actually end up in industrial composting facilities, and thus do not biodegrade as intended. Composting and recycling are still labor- and resource-intensive processes, so regardless of the material, single-use disposable food ware is not sustainable for Earth's population and natural resources, and fills our landfills.

But the biggest reason you should switch to durable reusables (dishwasher safe) is, you will save money. Even after accounting for costs of labor, water, and electricity, replacing disposable with reusable is a more economically sustainable long-term solution. Don't believe it?




