

Recycling right starts with making the right choices when you shop because so much of what we throw out at home is packaging. Not only do we have choices about the products we buy, we also have choices about the packaging they come in.

The grocery store is a great place to think about recycling. If we shop with the recycling hierarchy of "Refuse, Repair, Reduce, Reuse, and (then) Recycle" we can bring home less waste and reuse containers for food storage, too. The best choice would be to avoid packaging all together. Whenever possible, bring your own bags and containers to shop for loose produce, buy at the service deli/butcher/seafood counters, and in the bulk bins.

When buying items in packaging, choose those packed in materials that are easiest to recycle locally. Best choices include glass, unwaxed cardboard/paperboard, #1 and #2 plastics, aluminum, tin, and other metals. Packaging to avoid: materials you won't reuse, individually wrapped single-use items, Styrofoam, packaging that's hard to recycle (like chip bags and soup cartons), and other mixed materials not accepted by your local recycler.



#### WHAT TO DO WITH HOT ASHES?

- If you clean the fireplace before ashes are completely cool, be sure to put ashes and embers in a metal bucket with a lid. Move the covered bucket outside and away from anything combustible.
- Do not place hot ashes in a plastic garbage can, a cardboard box, or a paper grocery bag.
- Be sure your ashes are cold before placing them in your collection container. Consider the length of time required for ashes to cool enough before placing them out for collection; ashes can stay hot for up to 72 hours.
- Once cooled, you can bag ashes and throw them away in your regular garbage, or find other ways to reuse fireplaces ashes around your home.
  - Wood ash contains nutrients that can be beneficial for plant growth.
  - Ash from wood fires, such as bonfires or wood-burning stoves can be added to compost or dug directly into the garden.
  - Using wood ash in home gardens increases soil fertility and raises soil pH.
- · Burnt charcoal should sit overnight or be thoroughly mixed with water until cold. After charcoal has cooled, put them in a metal container like a coffee can before placing them in your trash can.

KEEP BATTERIES OUT OF THE LANDFILL

It is important to dispose of ALL batteries properly! Mismanaged batteries can leak toxic materials into the soil and groundwater, which can then reach our water supply. Batteries also present a fire risk when over-charged, short-circuited, submerged in water, and when they are damaged. Every year workers are put at risk and valuable waste collection equipment is destroyed when mismanaged batteries start fires.

Here is how to dispose of household batteries:

- GreenWaste Recovery customers can place household batteries in a zip-style bag on top of their blue recycle cart.
  - Batteries accepted include AA, AAA, C, D, 6-volt, 9-volt, camera batteries, nickel cadmium, and lithium-ion batteries.
  - To prevent sparks/fires, please tape the top terminals of all
    9-volt rectangular batteries and 6-volt square-base batteries for disposal.
  - o Note: Button-cell coin-shaped batteries are NOT accepted.
- Self-Haulers must self-haul batteries to a Household Hazardous Waste Facility.

Household batteries (alkaline, button batteries, nickel-cadmium) are accepted at the Santa Cruz County Household Hazardous Waste facilities at the following times and locations:

- Buena Vista Landfill: Open Fri. and Sat. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM, Wed. 7:30 AM-2:30 PM.
- Ben Lomond Transfer Station: Thurs. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM
- City of Santa Cruz Resource Recovery Facility: Sat. 7:30 AM-3:30 PM

## BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AND PUT YOUR CARTS AWAY

Santa Cruz County Code section 7.20.150 only allows GreenWaste Recovery collection containers to be placed within the right-of-way for 24 hours before and after pick-up time. Containers must be put away at all other times.





# SANTA CRUZ COUNTY ADOPTS CLIMATE ACTION AND ADAPTATION PLAN

#### WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT METHANE

METHANE is a greenhouse gas over 20-times more potent than carbon dioxide. When organic materials such as food and plant materials are buried in the landfill and break down anaerobically (without air), it creates methane.

A Global Methane Assessment conducted by the Climate and Clean Air Coalition (CCAC) and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) found that immediate reductions in methane emissions are the best, swiftest chance the planet has at slowing climate change.

NOW IS THE TIME: Keep organic matter out of the landfill. Place your food scraps and any organic waste into your GreenWaste Recovery green organics collection cart. Start with a sprinkle of baking soda and add some dried leaves or branches (keep some handy in a 5-gallon bucket), then add your food scraps. Spray a little citronella or bug spray to deter pests. Cover the food with branches or leaves and close the lid.

YOUR EFFORTS MATTER: These organic materials will make compost, a nutritious fertilizer that can replenish the soil for our farmers. Additionally, you will help reduce waste in our landfill, extending its life with no recyclables or organic waste taking up valuable space.

#### ZERO WASTE YOUR OUTDOOR EVENTS

Why waste time and money throwing out those single-use table settings? Prepare your zero waste kit now for picnics, camping and outdoor gatherings. A zero waste picnic kit with durable plates, cups, and utensils is a one-time investment that will make all your events easier. Store them all in a bag or tub that you can grab on the go, and place your used reusable items to take home for cleaning. Use reusable containers to bring home your leftover food, food scraps and recyclables from the campground or park. Let's work together to keep our outdoor spaces wastefree and beautiful!

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
